Buckingham Palace in London, England, is one of many tourist attractions in the United Kingdom. It is the London home of the Queen and is probably one of the most famous buildings in the world.

More than 50,000 people visit the Palace each year as guests at banquets, lunches, dinners, receptions and Royal Garden Parties. In the summer, organized tours take visitors to see some parts of the Palace.

The Queen lives in the Palace, but many people also work there. Inside, there are the offices of those who help with the daily activities and duties of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh and their family.

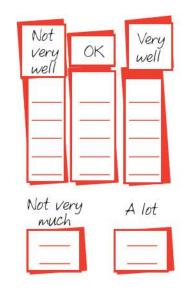

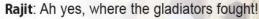
Rajit: Hi, Mario. Can you tell me some facts about Italy?

In this issue of the Culture Crew magazine, Rajit tells us about his grandparents and the country they live in.



About 1 billion people live in India and the largest cities are Mumbai, New Delhi (the capital city) and Kolkata. There are 17 different languages in India and over 800 dialects, but the national language is Hindi. To the north, there are the Himalayan Mountains and the Indian Ocean to the south. India has lots of national symbols - the tiger is the national animal, the peacock the national bird, and the mango is the national fruit. The national sport is hockey.

While I was staying with my grandparents last year, I tried lots of Indian food. Many Indians are vegetarians, and they eat spicy food with rice or Indian bread. It was strange for me because we ate with our fingers!

My grandparents live in Mumbai - it is a city of contrasts. The rich live in beautiful houses, but the poor live in houses of metal and cardboard. There are lots of

children who beg on the streets and many others have jobs because their families need the money. I saw one eight-year-old girl making footballs that Italian football teams use. It was awful.

I also visited the Taj Mahal – it took 22,000 men 22 years to build. Emperor Shah Jahan built it as a monument to his gueen. Her tomb lies below the huge white dome.

India really is an amazing country - visit if you have the chance!

In this issue of the Culture Crew magazine, Chih-Hao tells us about China, the country where his parents grew up.

China is a huge country with a population of over 1.3 billion people. The capital is Beijing and the national language is Chinese.

The Chinese have given the world many things, including paper, tea, and the martial art of kung fu. They also used the first umbrellas and played the first games of chess and football. Today, however, we don't think

of these things when we hear the word 'China'.

Instead, we think of Chinese New Year. The Chinese start spring cleaning a month before they celebrate New Year (in January or February - it is different every year) and they must finish their chores before the festival begins. All the Chinese celebrate their birthdays on this day, too. At New

Year, they eat fish, oranges and dates because they believe this will help them to live long and to be rich. The lion dance is another tradition at New Year two dancers dance inside a lion costume. On New Year's Day, you can't wash your hair or say the number 'four' because it is bad luck.

We also think of the Great Wall of China. It is 4,000 miles long and parts of it are over 2,000 years old. Historians think that over 2 million people died while they were building the wall. The Ming dynasty (a family that ruled China from 1368-1644) built most of the wall.

Even if you can't go to China, you can still have a taste of the country and its culture. Go to your nearest Chinese restaurant and try eating with chopsticks!

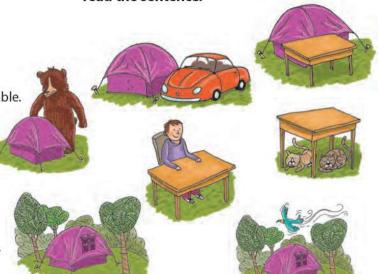

The **Aborigines** were the first people to live in Australia 40,000 years ago. In 1788, the first Europeans arrived. They were criminals sent to Australia as a punishment. Today, Australia's population is about 21 million. The nickname for Australian people is '**Aussies**' and the English often say '**Down Under**' when talking about Australia, for example, 'Peter lives down under' means 'Peter lives in Australia'.

Canberra is the capital city of Australia. Its name means 'meeting place' in the Aboriginal language. Over 1 million people live in the city of Perth. It is a very windy city, but the temperature is never very cold. Sydney is the largest city in Australia with about 4 million inhabitants. It is famous for its Harbour, its Bridge, and of course its Opera House.

One of the most famous inhabitants of Australia is the **koala**. Its name means 'no drink' in the Aboriginal language and it rarely drinks water. It lives in trees and eats eucalyptus leaves. It doesn't make a lot of noise, but sometimes communicates with snoring and burping sounds! Koalas look like bears, but they are marsupials. Another famous Australian marsupial is the kangaroo. Its baby is called a **joey** and it lives in its mother's pouch.

The Statue of Liberty stands at over 46 metres high on Liberty Island in New York Harbour, looking towards the ocean. In her right hand, she is holding a torch high above her head. The torch burns with the light of freedom. The arm holding it measures 14 metres, her index finger is 2.4 metres long, and her nose is almost 1.5 metres in length. Lady Liberty was a present to America from France in 1886 and was the tallest structure in the US at that time. She was a symbol of freedom and the friendship between the two countries. The idea for the statue came while some Frenchmen were having dinner in a restaurant in 1865. Frédéric-Auguste Bartholdi designed Lady Liberty and used his mother as the model for this huge goddess.

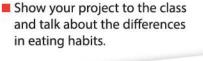
